Pre-Opera Talk...... Nelson Sheeley, Director

Synopsis

A mythical land between the sun and the moon. Three ladies in the service of the Queen of the Night save Prince Tamino from a serpent. When they leave to tell the queen, the bird catcher Papageno appears. He boasts to Tamino that it was he who killed the creature. The ladies return to give Tamino a portrait of the queen's daughter, Pamina, who they say has been enslaved by the evil Sarastro. Tamino immediately falls in love with the girl's picture. The queen, appearing suddenly, tells Tamino about the loss of her daughter and commands him to rescue her. The ladies give a magic flute to Tamino and silver bells to Papageno to ensure their safety on the journey and appoint three spirits to guide them.

Sarastro's slave Monostatos pursues Pamina but is frightened away by Papageno. The bird catcher tells Pamina that Tamino loves her and is on his way to save her. Led by the three spirits to the temple of Sarastro, Tamino learns from a high priest that it is the Queen, not Sarastro, who is evil. Hearing that Pamina is safe, Tamino rushes off to follow the sound of Papageno's pipes. Monostatos and his men chase Papageno and Pamina but are left helpless when Papageno plays his magic bells. Sarastro enters, punishes Monostatos, and promises Pamina that he will eventually set her free. Pamina catches a glimpse of Tamino, who is led into the temple with Papageno.

INTERMISSION

Sarastro tells the priests that Tamino will undergo initiation rites. Monostatos tries to kiss the sleeping Pamina but is surprised by the appearance of the Queen of the Night. The Queen gives her daughter a dagger and orders her to murder Sarastro.

Sarastro finds the desperate Pamina and consoles her, explaining that he is not interested in vengeance. Tamino and Papageno are told by a priest that they must remain silent and are not allowed to eat, a vow that Papageno immediately breaks when he takes a glass of water from a flirtatious old lady. When he asks her name, the old lady vanishes. The three spirits appear to guide Tamino through the rest of his journey and to tell Papageno to be quiet. Tamino remains silent even when Pamina appears. Misunderstanding his vow for coldness, she is heartbroken.

The priests inform Tamino that he has only two more trials to complete his initiation. Papageno, who has given up on entering the brotherhood, longs for a wife instead. He eventually settles for the old lady. When he promises to be faithful, she turns into a beautiful young Papagena but immediately disappears.

Pamina and Tamino are reunited and face the ordeals of water and fire together, protected by the magic flute.

Papageno tries to hang himself on a tree but is saved by the three spirits, who remind him that if he uses his magic bells, he will find true happiness. When he plays the bells, Papagena appears and the two start making family plans. The Queen of the Night, her three ladies, and Monostatos attack the temple but are defeated. Sarastro blesses Pamina and Tamino as they all join in hailing the triumph of courage, virtue, and wisdom.

Principal Artists



Aaron Smith (Tamino) has performed with Arizona Opera, Druid City Opera, First Coast Opera, and at the Brevard Music Festival, with roles including Mr. Erlanson in A Little Night Music, The Wigmaker in Ariadne auf Naxos, Tom Rakewell in The Rake's Progress, and Alfredo in La Traviata. He has also been a concert soloist, including the tenor soloist in Joseph Julian Gonzalez's Misa Azteca and Verdi's Requiem under Keith Lockhart.

Aaron returns to First Coast Opera this season to make his role debut as Tamino in *The Magic Flute*.

Lisa Lockhart (First Lady) is a frequent performer with First Coast Opera, where she has appeared in *Pasta & Puccini, Savitri*, and *Le Nozze di Figaro*. She holds a Bachelor's in Vocal Performance from The Boston Conservatory and is pursuing a Master's in Music Education at Columbia University. Lisa also teaches voice at Columbia University and Florida State College at Jacksonville and performs in the St. Augustine Romanza Festivale of Music & the Arts.





Raquel Rubí (Second Lady), a Cuban soprano, holds a Master's in Vocal Performance from FIU and a Doctorate from the University of Miami. She has performed principal roles in early music, opera, and operetta internationally, including the Baroness in *The Sound of Music* and Valencienne in *The Merry Widow*. Raquel is also an educator and the founder of RubiMusic, a nonprofit dedicated to classical music and the arts.

Regina Torres (Third Lady) returns to First Coast Opera for their 25th season, where she began her operatic career. She has appeared in numerous productions, including *The Trial of BB Wolf* and *La Vie Parisienne*. Regina is a versatile performer and has created cabarets for FCO, including *Cabaret Español* and *Opera Noir*. She teaches voice and shares her passion for performance with students at her private studio and Douglas Anderson School of the Arts





Sean Christopher Stork (Papageno) has performed across Florida since graduating from Florida State University. He made his FCO debut in 2001 and returns as Papageno. Past roles include Escamillo in *Carmen* and Guglielmo in *Così fan tutte*. Sean was nominated for Outstanding Performance by an Actor in a Leading Role in a Musical by Theatre Tampa Bay for his portrayal of Major General Stanley in *The Pirates of Penzance*.

Amber Rose (Queen of the Night) recently performed as Zerlina in *Don Giovanni* with Greensboro Opera. Her operatic repertoire includes roles such as Zerbinetta in *Ariadne auf Naxos*, Queen of the Night in *The Magic Flute*, and Adele in *Die Fledermaus*. Amber has earned several accolades, including first place in the South Carolina District of the Metropolitan Opera National Council Auditions. She holds degrees from Palm Beach Atlantic University and the University of North Carolina at Greensboro.





McKenna Slack (Pamina), a graduate of the University of North Florida, made her FCO debut as Musetta in La Bohème. She has won awards at NATS competitions and Metropolitan Opera National Council Auditions. Her credits include roles in Le Nozze di Figaro, Die Fledermaus, and Così fan tutte. McKenna teaches voice at Florida State College and continues to pursue her performance career.

Wyatt Matlock (Monostatos) is thrilled to return to First Coast Opera! A St. Augustine native, Wyatt is a recent graduate of Winthrop University in South Carolina, where he majored in Musical Theatre. Since returning home, he works as a Lead History Teller at Old Town Trolley Tours. Wyatt has performed Off-Broadway in



New York City and appeared in several college productions. His credits with First Coast Opera include *Amahl and the Night Visitors, I Pagliacci, The Pirates of Penzance*, and most recently *Carousel à la Carte*. He made his FCO debut in 2017 in *Trial by Jury* as a member of the jury.



Joe Colsant (Speaker of the Temple) is a bass-baritone and conductor with a diverse musical career. He has performed with Opera Orlando and First Coast Opera, including roles in Amahl and the Night Visitors and The Trial of B.B. Wolf. Joe has also performed as a bass soloist in the Faure Requiem in Rome. He is the music director at

Our Lady of Good Counsel Church.

Peter Barber (Sarastro) is a member of the Marion Roose Pullin Arizona Opera Studio and debuts with First Coast Opera this season. He has performed with notable opera companies, including The Santa Fe Opera and the Music Academy of the West. Peter is also known for his music analysis on YouTube and is part of the awardwinning group The Bass Gang. He holds a Bachelor's in Music from James Madison University.



Katie Matson (Papagena), a graduate of Brevard College, relocated to Florida and has performed with First Coast Opera in *I Pagliacci, La Traviata*,



and *Le Nozze di Figaro*. She has also sung with Opera Orlando and enjoys performing with FCO in various roles, including her debut as Annina in *La Traviata*. Katie is excited to perform as the Old Woman/Papagena in *The Magic Flute*.

Michael Palmisano (First Armored Man) is a young artist with a diverse background in opera, music theater, and sacred music. His recent roles include Gastone in *La Traviata* and Parpignol in *La Bohème*. Michael is excited to return to First Coast Opera for another performance opportunity.





Dirk Gavin McCoy (Second Armored Man) is a St. Augustine-based baritone who has performed in multiple productions with First Coast Opera, including *The Barber of Seville* and *The Stranger's Tale*. Dirk has also performed with New York City Opera and Washington National Opera and recently played the title role in *Gianni Schicchi* with Mid-Ohio Civic Opera.

Artistic Team

Curtis Tucker (Conductor) is in his eleventh season as General and Artistic Director of First Coast Opera, where he often conducts from the orchestra pit or occasionally ventures onstage. This season, he conducts *The Barber of Seville* and *The Magic Flute*. A native of Kansas City, Curtis led Opera Saratoga in New York before relocating to Florida. Last season, he



directed performances of his original one-act opera, *The Stranger's Tale*, in Saint Augustine, Jacksonville, and Mount Dora.



Nelson Sheeley (Stage Director) has been involved in professional theatre and opera since 1970, acting, directing, and stage managing. He served as Managing Director of Allenberry Playhouse for ten years, directing over 90 productions. Nelson has directed for First Coast Opera, Opera Saratoga, The Liederkranz Society, and

many more. He has collaborated with Curtis Tucker on multiple productions, including *Penelope Ann's Revenge*, *The Trial of B.B. Wolf*, and *The Stranger's Tale*. A graduate of the Yale School of Drama, he currently teaches and resides in Dayton, Ohio.

Gina Makarova (Costume Designer, Hair & Makeup Designer) returns to First Coast Opera for her second season, having previously designed hair and makeup for *La Bohème* and *Pirates of Penzance*. In Orlando, Gina works full-time in the wardrobe department of Orlando Ballet and has designed for Opera Orlando, with credits including *Carmen*, *Rigoletto*, *Die Fledermaus*, and more contemporary works like *The*



Secret River. In her spare time, she enjoys performing with Phantasmagoria Orlando.



Patrick W. Mathis (Lighting Designer) holds an MFA in Theatre Design and Technologies from Utah State University and a BS in Information Science and Technology from Mercer University. He has worked across the nation and internationally in technical theatre, lighting, and media design. Patrick is a member of CITT/ICTS, USITT, and Actors Equity and serves as

Assistant Professor of Design and Technology at Flagler College.

Jacksonville resident **Susan Roche (Stage Manager)** is thrilled to make her stage manager debut with First Coast Opera. With 19 years of diverse experience in the Northeast Florida theater community, Susan has contributed to numerous productions in a variety of roles. Her multifaceted background includes work as an

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
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
